Grace Academy is an independent, coed, classical and Christian K-12 school founded in 1999. Located in a suburb of Austin, Texas, Grace Academy has a campus of 35 acres and an enrollment of over 350 students in 2022-23. Tuition assistance is distributed to over 17% of the student body.

MISSION

The mission of Grace Academy is to glorify God by serving parents in providing their children a distinctly Christ-centered, academically excellent, classical education as a foundation for life-long learning

ACCREDITATION AND MEMBERSHIP

Grace Academy is accredited by the Association of Classical & Christian Schools (ACCS) which is recognized by the Texas Private Schools Association (TEPSAC).

FACULTY

91% of Grace Academy's high school faculty holds an advanced degree. All faculty members are supported in ongoing intellectual engagement, and many serve as leaders in their disciplines by publishing in journals and presenting at conferences.

ADMISSIONS

Grace Academy has a rigorous and highly selective admissions process. All students must demonstrate grade-level competency on entrance exams in reading comprehension and analysis, composition, and math. Admittance to the high school also requires recommendations, interviews, and the ability, desire, and commitment to succeed in an advanced curriculum.

SCHOOL DISTINCTIONS

Grace Academy provides a distinctly Christ-centered, academically excellent, classical education with a curriculum composed of the liberal arts and sciences, foreign languages, philosophy, theology, and fine arts. MATH AND SCIENCE

Students take four (or five) years of math (including Algebra I in 8th grade) and up to four years of science.

HISTORY AND LITERATURE

Students take four years of history and literature that focus on the ancient, medieval, and modern eras, as well as American history and literature. Based on an in-depth examination of primary and secondary sources, these courses provide a deep understanding of the roots of western civilization and equip students to intelligently engage with and respond to contemporary society.

LOGIC AND RHETORIC

In 7th and 8th grade students complete a study of informal and formal logic which provides a natural foundation for Speech and Debate, as well as Classical Rhetoric I and II. The Rhetoric and Senior Thesis courses focus on learning from the ancients to hone composition and presentation skills.

SENIOR THESIS

This culminating, year-long, required project offers students an opportunity to deeply explore a topic with a faculty member who guides the process of research, composition, and presentation. Each student writes, publicly presents, and orally defends a 15-20 page research paper.

FOREIGN LANGUAGE

All students are required to take Latin in 3rd – 9th grades. Starting in 10thth grade, students may either continue in Latin or begin a sequence in Greek. This study of classical languages provides a strong foundation for learning modern languages.

HONORS CLASSES

Grace Academy does not differentiate in the GPA scale between any courses: Honors, AP, HCU Dual Credit, or otherwise.

CLASS RANK

Due to selective admissions and rigorous curriculum and grading standards, Grace Academy generally does not rank students. However, the top ten percent of each class are ranked for the purpose of admission to Texas public universities.
